YOUTH & FAMILIES

On Sunday November 17 we celebrated 70 years of God's faithfulness at Gymea Baptist Church. From the humble beginnings of a Sunday School held in the home of John and Babs Turner with seven local children in 1940 there grew a small community of believers who formed Hotham Road Baptist Church nine years later, meeting in a re-purposed radar hut.


The story of GBC (whose name was changed in 1956 to reflect its geographical location) since those humble beginnings is pretty remarkable. GBC became a flagship church of the Baptist Association with a long heritage of resourcing the wider church. Locally, it was a community of faith with a thriving Sunday School; great facilities; sending and supporting missionaries around the globe; participating in the launch of national and international movements such as Bike for Bibles, Christian Surfers, or Olive Tree Media; vibrant ministry to youth; serving our community professionally through the founding of Hopefield; Carols in the Park; and on and on it goes.

Our story, however, is so much more than a list of accomplishments. Our story is ultimately part of God's story; a small part of God's global work of restoring and renewing the world in Jesus. The lives changed through the various ministries of GBC were changed by Jesus as people faithfully took up the invitation to join in with what God was doing.

This perspective draws our attention away from the institution of GBC to the kingdom of God, away from the amazing things that have happened here to the amazing God whose plans we participate with, away from the past to the future.

We have plenty to celebrate in our past and our history with God should fill us with confidence, hope, and anticipation of what the next chapters will look like as we follow in the footsteps of those who have gone before.






















LOCAL MISSION

Supporting relationships, while loving and serving people without condition, are common aims of our local mission groups.

Our Kids Hope team celebrated 10 years of building community in local public schools. They see God at work in matching the life experience of mentors with the needs of the children they connect with for an hour each week. See how Glen got involved in his story below.

Playtime fostered intergenerational relationships by enjoying animal-themed activities every day of Term 3, jumping castle fun and a soft-toy scavenger hunt in the church. They also made it simple for new families to join us on a Sunday for preschool KidZone "Lost Sheep" Day with real farm animals.

The Fathering Project goal of developing more effective father-figures has progressed with interactive events such as rock climbing, bike riding and gingerbread house making, and a well-attended, and thoroughly enjoyed, weekend camp - helping men take their next positive step towards happier, healthier futures for their kids.

COACH has also been Creating Opportunities And Casting Hope. One mentor, walking alongside an adult going through difficult times, appreciated their "fantastic attitude and willingness to implement change in your life". From the other perspective, mentees value "a loving and supportive person in nature who has been a very important constant in my life".

Glen's story

Twelve years ago, I prayer-partnered with my friend, John, who was a Kid's Hope mentor. The boy's family acknowledged the benefits and requested that John maintain contact through high school. Recently John was at this young man's 21st! This wonderful experience motivated me to participate in Kid's Hope. This year, I finally had opportunity

to mentor a child at Grays Point Public School. I now take a 9-year old boy out of class for one hour each Tuesday. Once we finish the English classwork set by his teacher, we can do what we want (boys' stuff). We discuss what we enjoy doing, I reminisce about being a young boy and we play handball which is his favourite game.

I know the boy's teacher from previously being his youth leader and soccer coach. Discussing how we can overcome some of the boy's issues and hearing how happy and positive he is after our time together is rewarding. I have experienced what a blessing Kid's Hope is, years ago as a prayer partner and now as a mentor.

GLOBAL MISSION

The world around us is changing in extraordinary and unimaginable ways. It can feel overwhelming, disorienting and easy to jump to fear to fill in the blanks of uncertainty - but Jesus invites us to view the shifting world around us through the lens of courageous faith.

We live in a global village that is multi-cultural, intergenerational and the new village square is online and digital. As we celebrate GBC's 70th birthday, the church of yesterday will look radically different to the church of the future – but Jesus's good news to restore and renew all things remains constant. Same message, different packaging.

In the Mission Department (Catalyst, Cambodia and Mission Action Group) we have been seeking where God is at work in the world around us and how it translates back to us. As we do that, we reflect and celebrate all that God has done through these teams.

For 8 years, the Fair Trade Market event has supported communities in over 20 nations receive fair work conditions and a living wage. For the past 10 years, over 90 people have been engaged with Cambodia teams, to experience where God is at work in a culture outside their own. In 18 years, May Mission Month has raised over \$3 million for more than 30 different organisations and missionaries. These are incredible

outcomes these teams have led, with our GBC faith community rallying behind them to make it a reality!

However as culture shifts and bends, conditions that made these endeavours successful no longer exist. We face new legislative requirements, diverse modes of generational engagement, the fragmented busyness of people's lives and layers of cultural complexity. Mission historically was 'west to the rest' (Western nations going to other nations), but now it is 'everyone

to everywhere'. Add to that, within GBC, we have been recalibrating a new empowering leadership model, vision and strategy, language and culture.

As we move to the future, our teams' purpose is to see people take up their unique invitation to participate with God's mission, whatever season, age or stage of faith they are at. Our core activities are around sending, advocacy, mission exploration and partnership. We are creating accessible pathways that connect our diverse, inter-generational congregation with mission in meaningful ways, that are flexible, sustainable and innovative – with the vision to see lives changed by Jesus. It's going to be a wild ride, that relies on the Holy Spirit's leading and everyone getting involved... so what's your next faithful step?!





HOPEFIELD - HOUSING FIRST

At Hopefield, we have always believed we need to bring both practical and therapeutic supports to genuinely impact people's lives. That's why we have a clinical team of psychologists, counsellors and speech therapists who work with individuals addressing a specific concern. Alongside this, we also have the Support Services team of social workers and case workers who meet practical needs such as connecting individuals and/or providing food, shelter, health, income and other basic necessities of life.

Homelessness in the Sutherland Shire looks very different to homelessness in inner city areas. Most homeless people in the shire are relatively hidden. While we do have those in the Sutherland Shire who spend their time hopping from friend's couch to couch, we have chosen to focus our support on those that are rough sleeping. Rough sleeping means having no fixed place of residence, often sleeping in cars, bushland or bus shelters.

One of the biggest challenges we have in working with homeless people is that they often have multiple needs. Housing is just the tip of the iceberg. Most homeless clients are also experiencing physical and mental health issues, financial distress, along with many basic needs not being met. Placing these

clients into appropriate housing is often the hardest part of the case manager's role and evidence shows that a "housing first" approach is the best long term first step.

An amazing new opportunity has recently presented itself in the form of a collaborative partnership. In a way never seen previously, government agencies (Housing, Health, Local Government and Police) are drawing on local services to identify and provide targeted support to homeless people in the Shire. Hopefield is first among these agencies. Still in its infancy the broad scope is to find, assess, and rapidly mobilise resources to provide housing, health and social supports to this vulnerable group of people.

As we focus on these new opportunities, we see God's fingerprints at work. Opportunities are arising and new doors are opening. Decisions that were made about Hopefield's services, long before this collaborative partnership was ever within our reach, indicate God was working back then and therefore we can trust that He is at work now. Whilst we do not yet know every step, we do know that God is faithful and so we boldly go forward as He leads, partnering with Him in the restoration and renewal of all things.

FINANCES

We have been praying for a new season of God's transforming work in Jesus and, as part of that, praying that God would show us where we are being invited into that work and that we would be prepared spiritually, organisationally, and financially for whatever is next.

One of the ways we are invited to participate is through our financial investment in the work of God. Your giving to the vision and mission of GBC allows us to say Yes to the invitation of God and enables us to serve the wider community. Thank you for your commitment to God's plans and purposes through faithful stewardship of your financial resources.
